#### **COURSE DESCRIPTION**



#### **Assignment Descriptions:**

#### Career Preparation Group Presentation

The class will be divided into groups and given a career industry to present on. Presentations should include resources, involvement opportunities, variety of careers within the genre, and any other helpful advice that a student pursuing that career must know. Students will be graded on the appearance, delivery, and content of the presentation.

#### • Resume Assignment

Bring in two hard copies of your updated resume. Please take into consideration the items discussed and reviewed in class, as well as taking advantage of resume critiquing resources across campus including the Career Resource Center.

#### Diversity Assignment

Attend a diversity activity from a culture you do not personally identify with. Write a brief reflection using the textbook (Pg. 260-262) as a guide.

#### • Service Learning Project

Attend class service project and participate in the reflection discussion.

#### Advising Appointment

Schedule a 1 on 1 advising appointment with your academic advisor. During the appointment make sure you answer the questions that are listed on the advising appointment sheet. Remember, you're always welcomed to ask any additional questions you may have.

#### Common Reading Program Event

Attend common reading event with the class and participate in post event discussion.

#### Personal PowerPoint Slide

Submit a PowerPoint slide, designed to reflect your personal style. The slide should include your name, at least 2 photos of memorable moments from your first semester at UF, and a brief statement of the most valuable thing you learned this term. The slide may be emailed to the instructor, but must also be presented in class.

#### Workshop Success Series – attend 2 (3 pts each)

Attend at least two workshops, and submit a photograph and brief reflection from the event.

#### Degree Audit

Bring either your laptop/netbook/netpad to class or a printed copy of your full degree audit from ISIS.

#### • Fall Fair Attendance

Students must attend at least one fair during the semester. A photograph and brief reflection must be submitted as documentation of attendance.

#### Academic Integrity Online Module
