Course Description:

First Year Florida is a course designed to aid students in a successful transition to the University of Florida. This course aims to help students develop the practical, social, emotional, and intellectual skills that are essential to a fulfilling four years at UF, provide a foundation for a well-rounded college experience, connect students to the University of Florida, promote engagement within and outside the classroom, and communicate university expectations.

LEARNING OUTCOMES:

First Year Florida educates new students to maximize their learning and development. As a result of take this course, students will:

- Connect with faculty, staff, and peers at the University of Florida.
- Identify university resources and services that contribute to their personal and educational goals.
- Recognize the purpose of reflection, critical thinking, and enriching educational opportunities within and outside the classroom.
- Evaluate the effects of personal well-being on student success and engagement.
- Recognize the academic, conduct, and citizenship expectations of the University of Florida.
- Develop an awareness and respect for being a part of a diverse global community.

Technology:

This class will utilize Canvas for assignment submissions in conjunction with in paper assignments. For every assignment submitted in this class, you will need to submit it via Canvas and bring a printed copy to class. Use of cell phones is only permitted when explicitly told to do so. For the most part, notes will be taken by hand, and thus, laptop/tablet use will be somewhat limited inside the classroom. Of course, please remain focused for the duration of class.

Assignment Descriptions

Gator CareerLink Profile Activation Assignment

Gator CareerLink is the portal to UF resources that can help you explore career paths, find ways to gain experience, and begin preparing for your career now! By activating your account, you will have access to all the Career Resource Center's services including job and internship postings, Career Planning appointments, an online mock interview module, and a calendar of all upcoming events and workshops. Activating your profile as a first-year student allows you to become familiar with the Gator CareerLink system and connects you to the CRC right away.

Part 1: (30 points) To activate your profile and receive credit, follow these simple steps:

- 1. Go to www.crc.ufl.edu
- 2. Click on Gator CareerLink Student Login.
- 3. You will be directed to a UF Authentication page. Type in your GatorLink username and password.
- 4. Next, click on "My Profile."
- 5. Fill out both the Personal and Academic profile as much as possible. You must complete all fields with a red asterisk in order to have an active profile. Make sure to save your information.
- 6. Once your profile is complete, click on "My Jobs."
- 7. Find and print an internship, part-time, full-time, or volunteer experience you would be interested in applying for now or in the future. To receive credit for this assignment, turn in the printed job description to your FYF instructor. You do not actually have to apply for the position this is just for practice.

Journal

Every few weeks, you will be asked to submit a minimum 1-page journal entry. Each prompt, if any, will ask you to reflect on a topic or concept learned the previous week. Really think about what we learned and how it pertains to your first year experience. We will grade on completion and apparent effort. You are asked to do the above at minimum but we encourage you to journal more often than the class requires. Include pictures if you'd like, document your Fall semester, and have fun with it!

- 10 points for personalized decoration
- 20 pts for each of the 6 journal entries
- No extra credit will be given for extra journal entries

Complete part 1 before meeting with Sam, come prepared with some questions about the 1st year experience, and follow up with part 2 reflection and turn it in as soon as possible. The worksheet will be uploaded to Canvas under Files.

Service Project Reflection

Our service project prior to the class is TBA. We want to give you all the chance to choose the project we will do together. Here are some options. Please circle/highlight the item we vote to do:

Next, you will provide a 3 page reflection covering these areas, each about 1-page:

- What?: Describe some of your experiences, what you expected, how they felt, what you learned, etc.
- <u>So what?</u>: What does service mean to you? Why is service important? How can individuals serve and be an active citizen in everyday life?
- Now what?: How has understanding diversity helped you better serve? How will you remain curious in order to learn and be an effective, educated citizen? How do you believe you will take these lessons into your daily life?

UF Professional 1-on-1

Meet with a faculty member and create a 1-page reflection of your experience. There will be a worksheet uploaded to Canvas to help you facilitate a conversation with the faculty, but feel free to create your own conversation. Preferably, we would like for you to meet with one of your professors, TAs, researchers, or a student affairs professional during office hours or by appointment. Email them asking to meet and let them know that it is for a class and that the conversation should take approximately 15-30 minutes (or more if they have time!). If your professors/TAs are too busy—which is understandable since many of them have many, many students to attend to—contact us and we can get you in contact with a staff member from the Dean of Students Office. So you have an idea of what questions you may ask:

- In what department do you primarily work at UF? Why did you choose it?
- Did you see yourself in this field early on?
- How has your connection to students propelled your career here?
- Why do you believe it is important for students to connect to faculty? What other advice do you have for first year students?

Final Portfolio

This is a culmination of your first year thus far! Let's celebrate and reminisce. Create a memory bag. Decorate the bag similar to your journal. Personalize it! Fill your bag with some memories of your first year, which could be any and all of the following:

- Photos
